The entire development will be fully completed by 2024.









Upgraded cycle and pedestrian paths will bring better access to the canal on our doorstep.
















A place to connect

Connecting people across Wilton Park

Wilton Park is a neighbourhood that welcomes in the community. Better links between Lad Lane and Wilton Park, as well easy and accessible pedestrian walkways, will connect people to animated streets with restaurants and retail, or to dwell in the public park or square.













Wilton Park restoration





Wilton Park restoration



28th May 2023 to Spring 2024

The park will be closed until spring 2024 while we complete restoration works that have been approved by Dublin City Council.

The works include:

Fountain: Restoration of the original fountain to full working order.

Lawns: The lawns will be renewed to include drainage, improved soil quality, and re-seeding.

Footpaths: The layout of the park remains the same with paths reconstructed to avoid winter flooding.

Seating: New seating will be included along the footpaths to complement the overall restoration of the park.

Planting: A wide variety of plants will be added to the shaded areas around the edge of the park bringing all year-round interest and improving the biodiversity of the area.

Living Canvas: The screen will be removed in June 2023.

The restored park will open in spring 2024 and operate in line with normal park opening hours.

Mary Lavin Place: a new cultural hub for Dublin



New square at Wilton Park named in tribute to writer Mary Lavin

Mary Lavin was one of the most influential Irish female writers of her generation. We are recognising her contribution by naming the new square at Wilton Park as Mary Lavin Place. It will be the first time a public place in Dublin City has been named after an Irish female writer.

Mary Lavin Place will form the social and cultural hub of Wilton Park. It will include a commemorative sculpture in Mary's honour, and a new community bookshop and social space. Through events, exhibitions and other community projects, we want to bring the neighbourhood together to celebrate our city's heritage and continue to enrich people's experiences through art and culture.

About Mary Lavin

Mary Lavin was born in the US in 1912, and moved to Ireland when she was 10. Her first volume of short stories, *Tales from Bective Bridge*, was published in 1942 and won the James Tait Black Memorial Prize. Renowned for her mastery of the short story, Lavin was also a writer of novels and poems. Her legacy, however, is not only to literature but to the Irish literary ecology. Her mews in 11 Lad Lane, where she lived between 1958 and 1981, was a literary hub, where writers such as Frank O'Connor, Sean O'Faolain and John McGahern regularly fraternised. Mary Lavin was a keen supporter of a younger generation of writers such as Nuala O' Faolain and Colm Toibin, often offering them support on their own journeys as writers.
